



Key Achievements of 2024

The Neglected Therapy in Malaria Management

Date: April 23, 2024



94% of all malaria cases and **95%** of deaths arise from the WHO Africa region, children under **5 years** account for **78%** of malaria deaths in the region.

Why the Need for Blood Transfusion in Malaria Management Is Critical

Severe malaria-induced anaemia is a major cause of mortality in Africa, yet access to safe blood remains inadequate.

CoBA hosted this webinar to:

- Pring attention to the overlooked role of blood transfusion in malaria management.
- Push for policy reforms that prioritize safe blood access.
- Foster collaboration between key stakeholders, including governments, private sector partners, and health institutions.
- Drive innovation by showcasing Aldriven diagnostics and rural blood supply solutions.

Key Outcomes of the session:

- Shifted the narrative: The webinar successfully placed blood transfusion on the agenda of malaria management discussions.
- Engaged decision-makers: Policymakers, healthcare professionals, and industry players participated, opening doors for policy changes.
- Catalyzed action: Discussions from the webinar have informed ongoing advocacy efforts and partnerships aimed at improving blood access.
- Call to Action: Inspired advocacy efforts and national campaigns to drive blood collection and accessibility.

This webinar reinforced CoBA's role as a thought leader in Africa's blood ecosystem, pushing for sustainable policy and systemlevel improvements.

The challenges of managing blood systems, particularly in malaria-prone regions, are complex, especially regarding the necessity of malaria testing before transfusion. Prioritizing campaigns for malaria elimination is vital. Ensuring thorough pathogen inactivation is also crucial for preventing transmission. However, implementing widespread malaria testing protocols faces obstacles due to cost constraints. It's essential to weigh the benefits and risks carefully, directing resources toward elimination efforts and pathogen inactivation. While clinicians prioritize saving lives over addressing transfusion-related risks, effective systems for monitoring such risks are necessary.

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At Webuye County Hospital, we see countless severe malaria cases daily, with nearly 80% requiring blood transfusions. The challenge? There's never enough blood. We've lost patients simply because we couldn't get them the blood they needed in time. In some cases, healthcare workers have had to donate blood themselves to save lives. The need for a better blood supply system is urgent lives depend on it.

Empowering Youth to Champion Blood Access in Africa

Africa faces severe blood shortages with only 6 units collected per 1,000 people, compared to 33 per 1,000 in high-income countries (WHO). Limited policies, cultural misconceptions, and weak infrastructure restrict access. Despite 22.7% of Africa's population being youth, their potential in addressing this crisis remains untapped.

CoBA's Action

To mobilize youth in blood donation advocacy, CoBA hosted the Youth Symposium on June 19, 2024 at Strathmore University, Nairobi. The event brought together 88 youth leaders to discuss innovative solutions and policy engagement.

Developed key strategies, including:

- Expanding school-based education to normalize voluntary blood donation.
- Leveraging social media and public events like Damu Festival to dispel misconceptions.
- Advocating for mobile blood units to improve access in remote areas.
- Encouraging incentives such as health check-ups and awards to sustain donation efforts.

Impact

- Raised awareness on the role of youth in tackling blood shortages.
- Strengthened policy and advocacy, emphasizing transparent government funding for blood programs.



Having lost my brother to sickle cell and experienced the struggle myself, it warms my heart to see young people passionately fighting for awareness and change. As a warrior, I know the journey isn't easy.

I probably spent only 4 years in primary school and only 2 in high school, while the rest of my time I was in and out of hospitals.

I wouldn't have survived without the blood donations I received. Today, I am very happy to share my story and be associated with COBA, an organization that is creating real change by involving youth. Much more needs to be done, and I'm proud of COBA for acting and making a difference.

Advancing Policy for Sickle Cell Disease Care and Blood Access

Africa's ongoing blood shortage continues to put millions of Sickle Cell Disease (SCD) patients at risk. In 2024, CoBA actively engaged in policy advocacy to strengthen national blood systems and promote sustainable government investment in blood services.

Key Highlights

World Sickle Cell Day (June 19, 2024)

CoBA participated in advocacy efforts in Nairobi, engaging policymakers and stakeholders to push for sustainable blood policies.

SCD & Haemophilia Conference : (June 11-13, Kisumu)

CoBA highlighted the urgent need for regular blood donations and stronger policies, reaching decision-makers in healthcare.

Policy Engagement: CoBA contributed to national discussions on strengthening blood systems by emphasizing:

- Expanding voluntary blood donation to address shortages.
- Increasing government investment in blood services.
- Integrating blood advocacy into public health campaigns for long-term impact.

Partnerships, Awareness & Collective Action

Africa's blood shortage remains a critical barrier to healthcare, with voluntary donation rates still too low to meet demand. Many countries collect less than 6 units per 1,000 people, far below the 10 per 1,000 needed. This gap puts women with childbirth complications, children with severe anemia, and trauma patients at severe risk.


Through targeted advocacy, CoBA continues to push for:

- Stronger national blood donation strategies
- Increased government investment in blood services
- Integration of blood donation into public health priorities

With support from Tanzania Red Cross Society, The Blood Drive Network, Bone & Blood Foundation, and Kenya Blood Transfusion and Transplant Service(KBTTS), CoBA is fostering a sustainable blood system for Africa.

Impact

- 10,000+ pints of blood collected in Kenya, Tanzania, Nigeria & Uganda
- **30,000+** patients received life-saving transfusions

Paint the Profile Red – A Youth-Led Digital Movement (June 2024)

To mark World Blood Donor Day, CoBA launched Paint the Profile Red a campaign that encouraged young people to use their voices and social media presence to advocate for blood donation.

What We Did

- Mobilized youth to share messages of gratitude and encouragement, inspiring more people to donate blood.
- Amplified awareness by encouraging social media users to paint their profiles red with advocacy messages.
- Educated communities on the importance of voluntary blood donation through digital storytelling.

Impact

- Increased youth participation in blood donation drives across multiple countries.
- Reached 1000+ people through digital advocacy, driving engagement.
- Strengthened public awareness, fostering a culture of regular blood donation.

Bridging the Holiday Blood Shortage: CoBA's December 2024 Digital Campaign

The holiday season sees a surge in traumarelated emergencies, yet blood donation rates remain dangerously low. With Africa accounting for 16% of global road traffic fatalities, the need for a stable blood supply is more urgent than ever

What We Did



- Output

 Used QR-coded flyers to help donors locate nearby blood banks easily.
- Raised awareness about the importance of regular voluntary blood donation through digital advocacy.

Many potential donors lack information on where to donate.



Blood donation is still viewed as an emergency response rather than a consistent practice.

On October 28-29, 2024, CoBA participated in the East Africa Blood Disorders Leadership Forum hosted by Novo Nordisk Haemophilia Foundation, Novo Nordisk Foundation, Kenya Haemophilia Association, Sickle Cell Federation of Kenya, and Fondation Pierre Fabre advocating for improved care and policies.



On July 23, 2024, CoBA joined Africa Health Business in launching its inaugural Impact Report, alongside key health leaders from WHO and Africa CDC, celebrating 9 years of advancing healthcare in Africa.



On May 14, 2024, CoBA Lead Caroline Wangamati spoke at the Roche EMEA–LATAM Regional Conference in Nairobi highlighting the power of partnerships in improving patient access.



March 4-7, 2024, CoBA participated in the 11th AfSBT Congress in Kampala, engaging with experts and industry leaders to advance innovations and partnerships for improving blood transfusion services in Africa.
